A Message From the Interim Minister



As many of you know, my family reunion is coming up in October. It is exciting for me to think about how my clan has grown from 9 children and 2 parents to close to 200 people since their arrival at Ellis Island 100 years ago. We celebrate our Scottish heritage with bagpipers, stories, photographs, meat pies, sausage rolls, and a service of worship that celebrates the births, deaths, marriages, and other significant life events of our clan. We love being together! But the last time we met, it became clear that while we all came from the same gene pool, we are not all alike. We like different foods, different music, and different books. Some are well traveled while others seldom venture far from home. Some have earned advanced college degrees and others have chosen vocations of service through the fire, police, or military. We are all different. I am usually accepting of differences, but I became concerned when I came to learn how different we are, especially when it comes to politics. I know my family has many political leanings and some strong beliefs. The other side of my family deals with differences by having a rule to not talk about them. My McPherson side deals with differences differently. We listen, withhold judgement, and commit to being open to another's point of view. No one is invested in changing someone else's mind, only in trying to understand a point of view different than their own.

I would like to suggest that perhaps we may want to try that at First Congregational Church of Wallingford as we enter into an already contentious political season leading up to our November election of a new president. I think of this season as an opportunity to practice important skills together and to learn from one another as we listen to other points of view. It is an opportunity to reflect on the teachings of Jesus and the values we see emerging from those teachings. We can then choose who we vote for based on our values and how we see those values reflected in each candidate's platform. You know I understand the world and our faith to be intricately connected. I can think of no one I would rather think about that with than my siblings in faith. I will never tell you who to vote for. I am curious how you connect your faith, life, and political choices. I am curious about your needs, hopes, and wants for the future. I am curious how we might have civil fruitful discourse about challenging topics that affect all our lives. After all, isn't that what church is for?

Let's think, reflect, and wrestle together. Let's place God and the teachings of Jesus in the center of our decision making. Let's open ourselves to bold, respectful, curious conversations. Any takers?

MISSION MONEY AT WORK



As the scripture says: "You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. ¹⁵ Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. ¹⁶ In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven." Matthew 5:14-16

Your mission team was at work this spring and summer using your mission money to support organizations and spread our values. We supported a broad spectrum of organizations engaged with immigrants, disabled, LQBTQ+, homeless, food insecure, cancer patients, addiction, school bullying and international relief. We continue to *donate* internationally, nationally, locally and within our church community while keeping our mission and values in mind. In May, we participated in The Great Give held by The United Way of Greater New Haven. During this 36 hour event over \$3.8 million dollars was donated to over 549 organizations. We felt strongly about the mission of the organizations we selected and also having our church participate in the philanthropic effort. The donations made are included with other donations made below:

Supporting our world & church

BAWA – Bawa Health Initiative is established for the purpose of reducing the prevalence of endemic diseases in the village of Bawa, Cameroon and other neighboring villages. Their goals are to treat, empower, and educate through interventions, collaboration, and ongoing research. We donated \$500..

All Hands and Hearts – They are a community-inspired, volunteer powered disaster relief organization. With the dramatic weather in our country, we decided to support the cause. We donated \$250.

Supporting our country

Rachel's Challenge - This nonprofit organization addresses the root causes of school violence, bullying, prejudice, and self-harm through student wellness programs that build connection, hope and resilience.. We donated \$250.

Open & Affirming Coallition - The Open and Affirming Coalition of the United Church of Christ advocates for the lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender community, and equips UCC congregations to become effective witnesses to Christ's extravagant welcome. This organization provided our church and other church with resources. We donated \$500

A Kinder Ground Inc. – A nonprofit organization working diligently to raise funds in order to open a small café where young adults who are differently-abled can develop their job, social and educational skills in a supportive environment. As part of The Great Give we donated \$104.92.

Havenly, Inc. – A nonprofit assisting refugee and immigrant women through job training, education and organizing. As part of The Great Give we donated \$104.92.

Tricircle Corporation – A nonprofit organization that provides resources for individuals, families, and communities affected by the disease of addiction.

Through education and community engagement, it is dedicated to providing the tools that build strong futures. As part of The Great Give we donated \$104.92 as part of The Great Give and another \$250 in August.

Supporting our local community

Wallingford Community Dinners – The Wallingford Community Dinner is now a separate 501(c)(3) organization continuing to serve holiday meals to those in need or alone in our community. As part of the Great Give we donated \$ 104.92. (Special note – board members of the organization were not involved in the decision to donate any money.)

Wallingford Public Library. – The Wallingford Racial Justice Team, in partnership with Wallingford Public Library and other community-based organizations and local venues, is hosting an initiative called The Wallingford Table in which residents of all ages, races, ethnicities, identities, abilities, and socioeconomic backgrounds are invited to have a seat at the table. Through this program series, participants will have the opportunity to share traditions, build personal connections, and experience Wallingford as a warm and welcoming community. As part of The Great Give we donated \$104.92.

Grace & Saint John's Church — The mission of The Wallingford Table is to foster intentional dialogue between the diverse communities of the Town of Wallingford through culinary experiences. We believe that bringing people together to share a meal is fundamental to breaking down barriers, building new friendships, and celebrating the unique aspects of our many cultures. Food is part of the human experience and an essential tool for building community. By engaging each other through it, we hope to start conversations about inclusivity, equity, sustainability, and multiculturalism that will help us better understand one another and the impact we have on the land we call home. As part of The Great Give we donated \$104.92 to support their meal program.

The Sister's Project – A local organization committed to raising funds to help cancer patients and their families. As part of The Great Give we donated \$104.92.


Master's Mana – This organization is essential to meeting the needs of the homeless, near homeless, low to moderate income families and those facing food insecurity in the local Wallingford/Meriden community. While we have held many monthly drives to donate items, we felt it important to make a monetary donation of \$250.

Chrysalis Center – This organization provides supportive services to assist people in need to transform their lives. Founded in 1975 to provide critical support services to adults living in poverty who struggled with mental illness to help them live as independently as possible in the community. It has expanded to help individuals living below the poverty level and struggling with food insecurity, dealing with substance abuse, HIV/AIDS, release from incarceration and homelessness through case management, community employment services, community supportive housing, recovery services and affordable housing. We donated \$400

No Kid Hungry (Share Our Strength)- No Kid Hungry is a campaign of Share Our Strength, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that believes all children and families deserve to live free from hunger and poverty. Your gift will be used to help support Share Our Strength's comprehensive strategies and initiatives to end childhood hunger. We donated \$250.

Join the 350th "Voices of Devotion" Project!

As one of the many ways we will be celebrating the 350th Anniversary of the First Congregational Church in 2025, the 350th Anniversary Team has proposed a "Voices of Devotion" Project. Modeled after the Upper Room devotionals that so many of us know and use for our daily devotional time, we are seeking devotionals written by past, present and (hopefully) future members and friends of FCC. We have set an ambitious goal of compiling 350 devotionals, one for each year of our anniversary. To achieve this, we need your help and contribution.

We know that some may find the idea of writing a public devotional to be intimidating, but we want to remind you that the purpose of this project is to celebrate the many voices that have and do worship God at First Congregational Church. We are not looking for New York Times bestselling authors to write these pieces. We are looking for YOU, the heart and soul and history of FCC, to lend your voice and offer a devotion that speaks from your heart.

Offering some guidance from *The Upper Room* may be helpful as you consider your involvement in this project. In the July-August 2024 Upper Room (pp. 40-41), Andrew Garland Breeden offers the following advice for writing a devotional:

"If you are concerned that your story isn't exciting, glamorous, or interesting enough, don't worry. Write from your heart. Stories about everyday experiences make wonderful meditations. Some of my most memorable and meaningful spiritual insights have occurred on an afternoon hike, during an interaction with a stranger, or while reading scripture. Here are some questions to help you get started. Can you think of a small, ordinary experience from your life that has ultimately had a significant effect on your spiritual journey and strengthened your relationship with God? What was the experience? How and why did it affect you so profoundly? What story or passage from scripture do you connect with your experience? What did your experience teach you about yourself, and what did it teach you about God? What do you want other people to learn from it? Can you answer these questions?" If you can, YOU are the right contributor to our "Voices of Devotion" project.

To create your devotional: Choose a Bible scripture that speaks to you or connects to the story you have to tell. Describe your story and how it relates to the scripture. Describe how you apply this story and its spiritual truth to your life. How do you hope others might apply it to theirs?

We pray you say YES to participating in this project. If you do, please use the attached form to submit your devotion. The "Voices of Devotion" team members will be in touch to confirm the receipt of your submission. If you do not hear from us, please assume we have not received it, and contact us at fcc350devotionproject@googlegroups.com. We are setting an initial deadline of 12/1/2024 for submissions.
